



Teaching Strings That Are Your Secondary Instruments: The Right Method Book as Your Survival Guide (O)

The use of well-designed methods can be the models for the process of learning technique in strings classes. 2020 SCMEA Honor Administrator Award



Dr. Brenda Mack-Foxworth, principal Ridge View High School

Dr. Brenda Mack-Foxworth is the principal of Ridge View High School. She has served in this capacity for seven years. Ridge View is built on the foundation of the 4 A's (Academics, Activities, Arts, Athletics). This foundation has become the center stone of the school wide magnet, AiMS, Arts Innovation for Medical Sciences which is reimagining

education for a changing world. Building on a foundation of excellence, Dr. Mack-Foxworth helps to make it possible for all students to have a magnet experience with innovative curriculum connections across Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Math, and Medical (STEAMM). Ridge View focuses on the development of the whole student, both mind and body, for global citizenship. Teachers are using AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination) WICOR strategies (writing, inquiry, collaboration, organization, and reading) to prepare students for success. Students encounter real-world learning, with integrated curriculum links, guest specialists, and field experiences connected to STEAMM. Ridge View is taking traditional education to the next level to prepare students to be who they aspire to be. Ridge View also has three other magnet programs including Allied Health Sciences, BioHealth Sciences, and Scholars Academy Magnet for Business and Law. The additional magnet programs are for academically talented students wanting to pursue a career-focused curriculum. Ridge View also houses five additional smaller learning communities which include the School for the Arts, for students who are talented in visual, musical, dance, and theater, AVID, Blazer Academy (a freshman academy), CAT (Carolina Alliance for Technology specializing in engineering and computer science) and Early College. Every student has an opportunity to feel at home at Ridge View.

While principal of Ridge View High School, Dr. Mack-Foxworth has made many contributions to the students, staff, and community. She worked tirelessly to implement the Arts Innovation for Medical Sciences program throughout the whole school. She also restructured the Career and Technology Education department by surveying the community and students and replacing outdated programs with programs the students and community wanted. She implemented the Carolina Alliance for Technology program with an emphasis on computer science and engineering, a Barbering program, and an Allied Health and BioHealth Science magnet program. Due to her relationship with the community, community leaders participate within the school as guest speakers and provide relevant shadowing opportunities for Ridge View students. In addition to programmatic changes, Dr. Mack-Foxworth listens to teachers, parents, students, and community members to help create change as Ridge View grows. Dr. Mack-Foxworth allows teachers to continue to grow by challenging them to foster their skills and create a professional development program so that student needs are met and achievement increases. Every stakeholder has a voice for change at Ridge View.

Prior to becoming the principal, Dr. Mack-Foxworth was Ridge View's Assistant Principal of Instruction for nine years. Her administrative experience is preceded by service as a high school Math teacher. Dr. Mack-Foxworth began her career in education as a high school Mathematics teacher at Eau Claire High School in Richland District One. Later she returned to her alma mater, Spring Valley High School, to serve as an assistant administrator. Her journey as an educator started at the University of South Carolina where she earned her Bachelor's degree of Science in Mathematics, a Master of Arts in Teaching, and a Master of Education in Education Administration and her Doctoral Degree in Educational Leadership from Nova Southeastern University. Dr. Mack-Foxworth and her husband, Calvin Foxworth, have two beautiful children. Savannah is a junior at Ridge View and Tyler is a proud graduate of Ridge View.

Marlin T. Ketter, band director

Hartsville Middle School



Mr. Marlin T. Ketter has served the community of Hartsville for 6 years and is currently the Director of Bands at Hartsville Middle School. With his active role with the Bands of Hartsville Middle and High School (Concert Band, Wind Ensemble, Marching Band, Chamber Ensembles), as well as his previous teaching responsibilities at the Elementary Level in both Hartsville and Darlington, Marlin Ketter has reached, encouraged and influenced a large number of students in the Darlington County School District.

Mr. Ketter has grown, developed, and sustains a thriving middle school band program at Hartsville Middle School. When he began his career at Hartsville Middle School, Mr. Ketter inherited a program of 125 students with 3 region band members and ratings of "Good" at Concert Performance Assessment. In 2 years

as director, has grown the program to over 250 students, more than tripled the number of students earning a position in the Region Band, earning ratings of "Superior" at CPA. Mr. Ketter accomplished this while assisting an established high school band program, earning his Masters in Music Education, publishing a thesis, and serving the community as Director of Summer Arts Program at Darlington County School District.

In addition to his classroom responsibilities, Mr. Ketter has incorporated diverse ensembles and performance opportunities for his students in extracurricular settings, sponsored guest clinicians and lesson teachers, helped grow other arts within the school district and served as Team Leader (Elementary Division) for Related Arts. Mr. Ketter has had a tremendous impact with his students and will continue to leave a lasting impression with his students as well as all others to whom he comes in contact.











Andre J. North, band director Hanahan Middle School

Andre J. North is the band director at Hanahan Middle School. The retired director, Jim Stroman, brought Andre to Hanahan Middle School to continue and build the program. That, he has done! Andre, a former student of Jim Stroman and Kathleen Vogt, works diligently to offer many musical opportunities to his students and encourages them to take advantage of those opportunities. Many students have obtained chairs in All County Band, All County Jazz Band (which he organized and directed), Region Band, and the South Carolina All State Band.

Under Mr. North's direction, the band has received "Superior" ratings at Concert Performance Assessment all 4 years he has been at the school. The band has also received "Superior" ratings at the Carowinds Music Festival and a high number of Hanahan Middle School band students successfully perform with "Superior" ratings at Solo and Ensemble Festival. In addition to being an excellent educator, Andre is also an outstanding musician. He plays in the Charleston Wind Symphony, Saint James Wind Symphony and is the assistant director of the Hanahan Marching Pride.
