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


Celebrating Music Education in South Carolina

Happy 85th Birthday to SCBDA!!!

Did you know that the formation of what is now known as SCBDA was an indirect result



of the Eighth Regional - National Music Contest/ Festival, held at Winthrop College, June 6th through the 8th of 1937? At a business meeting held during the festival, the first Regional Officers were elected. Vernon Allen of Rock Hill High School, was appointed the South Carolina State Chairman. It became his duty to promote the organization of the South Carolina Band and Orchestra Association. In the months that followed, band and orchestra directors throughout the state were notified of an organizational meeting to be held at the Jefferson Hotel in Columbia, during the fall of 1937. The Jefferson Hotel stood at the corner of Main and Laurel Streets from 1913 until 1968. At this meeting Vernon Bouknight was elected President, Guy Hutchins was elected Vice-President, and Vernon Allen was elected Secretary-Treasurer.

Now we are entering a year of celebration, historical landmarks, and resuming in-person events such as our SCMEA In-Service Conference! I'm honored to serve as your SCBDA President and I'm committed to providing the best opportunities for all students, the directors of SCBDA, as well as your schools and communities. Please be patient as I'm sure that there will be bumps along the way as SCB-DA proudly returns to its normal capacity. Our state chairs and committee members are diligently working to provide the best that we have to offer your students and our many events. Congratulations one and all for finding creative ways to *adapt* and *endure* through this second school year of a global health pandemic. And, a big thanks here to those who were able to join in our

In that discussion, colleagues shared particulars on how they are managing Covid-related challenges in terms of field experience and student teaching placements. A healthy amount of time was also spent discussing current resources within the broad topic of "music education and social justice." In our February in-person (yes!) divisional meeting at the SCMEA Professional Development Conference, social justice through music education will be a central focus of our continuing discussions. The goal will be to determine some action items for the Division within one or more specific "lanes" in this broad and critical topic.

Once again, there is a robust slate of clinics, sessions, and concerts to look forward to at the February SCMEA conference. We are offering some wonderful presentations sponsored by our division that I hope you will make plans to attend. 

American conductor, Anthony Parnther, is the son of immigrants. His father emigrated to the United States from Kingston, Jamaica at the height of the Korean War and served in the US Navy. His mother came to America from the remote Pacific microstate of Samoa. Anthony was born in Norfolk, Virginia, and the family eventually relocated to Washington D.C. and New York City before settling in central Virginia where Anthony became active in the instrumental music program. While in high school, Anthony learned the bassoon and the tuba and developed secondary interests in acting, singing, forensics, and creativewriting before deciding to enter university fully committed to music.

Anthony is Music Director of the Southeast Symphony, an appointment he has held since 2010. The Southeast Symphony is recognized as America?s most diverse symphonic institution and in 2018, celebrates its 70th anniversary. Hewas profiled by Los Angeles' KCET/ TV as "Local Hero" in 2015 during black history month for his contributions to classical music, community outreach, and passionate advocacy for the performance of works by minority and women composers. In 2018, he was featured on the BBC 3's In Tunewith Sean Rafferty.

As a conductor, Parnther has concertized on five continents and has garnered considerable praise for his orchestral leadership and interpretative prowess. Only two maestros have had the distinction of opening Southbank Centre?s venerableQueen Elizabeth Hall in London, England. Benjamin Britten conducted the inaugural concert in 1967; Anthony Parnther had the honor of re-opening the newly renovated hall 50 years later (after three years closure for renovations) with the Chineke! Orchestra. The historic concert, which was broadcast live internationally on the BBC3, was met with universal critical acclaim by London?s activemedia and press.

Anthony is a leading advocate for the performance of orchestral works by minority and women composers, both of whom arewidely neglected in America's leading concert halls. Lauded for his championship of this genre, Anthony has successfully commissioned, reconstructed, performed and/ or recorded over 100 works in this genre. This list includes scholarly restorations, reconstructions, performances and premieres of works by Florence Price, Zenobia Powell Perry, GeorgeWalker, Wynton Marsalis, Margaret Bonds, Renee Baker, John Wineglass, Gary Powell Nash, William Grant Still, Adolphus Hailstork, Duke Ellington, Marian Harrison, and Samuel Coleridge Taylor.

In 2018, Anthony conducted the world premiere of James Newton?s ?Glimpses of theGarden of Eden? at Schoenberg Hall in Los Angeles. He conducted the premiere performance of Daniel Kidane?s ?Dream Song? (based on Martin Luther King Jr.?s ?I Have a Dream? speech) which was commissioned specially for the reopening of Queen Elizabeth Hall and performed on the 50th anniversary of MLK?s internment. This work was recorded for release on the NMC label. Also in 2018, he recently recorded works by a series of Afro-British composers. These sessions, which took place at All Saint?s in London, includes Errollyn Wallen?s ?Concerto Grosso,? JamesWilson?s ?TheGreen Fuse,? and Philip Herbert?s ?Elegy: In Memoriam Stephen Lawrence.?

Anthony is in demand as a session conductor in the LA recording studios and led the Hollywood Studio Symphony on all the historic Los Angeles scoring stages, including 20th Century Fox, MGM/ Sony, Warner Brothers, and Capitol Records. He Anthony has collaborated with a who?s who of artists from every musical genre, including Joshua Bell, Frederica von Stade, Roderick Williams, Cirque de la Symphonie, RZA, Wu-Tang Clan, the Canadian Brass, KanyeWest, Wes Borland, Imagine Dragons and Rihanna.

League of Legends®, with its over 100 million active players worldwide, is themost played video game on earth and Anthony has served as it's Principal Conductor since 2014. These live concerts attract some of themost massive crowds an orchestra has concertized for. With live audiences upwards of fifty-thousand in attendance, the live broadcasts of the LOL World Finals opening and closing ceremonies outpace the World Series with an average of thirty-five to forty million viewers worldwide. Anthony has led international League of Legends mega-concert productions globally, including the World Cup Stadium (Seoul, South Korea), the Palau Sant Jordi (Barcelona, Spain), the Water Cube and Birds Nest National Stadium (Beij ing, China), and the Staples Center (Los Angeles, CA).

Anthony previously served as Music Director of the Orange County Symphony (Anaheim, CA) and the Inland Valley Symphony. (now the Temecula Valley Symphony) In 2008, Anthony founded the Orange County Wind Symphony, which was invited to perform at Carnegie Hall. In 2015, he established the Wind Orchestra of the West, comprised of musicians from Southern California's preeminent orchestras including the Los Angeles Philharmonic, Los Angeles Opera, Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra, Pacific Symphony, and Hollywood Studio Symphony.

A dedicated educator, he taught at the University of California, Berkeley, from 2010 - 2015 where hewas theMusic Director of the nationally acclaimed Young Musicians Choral Orchestra. From 2015-2017, Mr. Parnther was named Artist in Residence at theOakwood School. He taught at Fullerton College from 2008 - 2010. Prior to moving to California, Anthony led theOperaWorkshop, Concert Band, Athletic Bands, and the Marching Buccaneers at East Tennessee StateUniversity.

Anthony studied orchestral conducting at Northwestern University with Victor Yampolsky and at Yale University with Lawrence Leighton Smith. He also received guidance and mentorship from mentorships with Cliff Colnot, W. Francis McBeth, and Frank Battisti. He resides in Los Angeles.

Alicia W. Walker is Director of Choral Studies at the University of South Carolina, where she directs the Concert Choir and the UofSC TTBB Choir, and supervises the graduate conducting program. Each year Dr. Walker travels to South Africa to teach continuing education for choral directors, and she is regularly invited to conduct and teach in England and in Taiwan. Dr. Walker made her conducting debuts at Carnegie Hall in 2015, and at Lincoln Center in 2019. Her choirs have been selected to perform for SCMEA and for South Carolina's ACDA conference. Dr. Walker's pedagogy and professional interactions are marked by a commitment to excellence, collaboration, and inclusion.

An experienced music educator, Dr. Walker taught at the elementary, middle and high school levels, followed by appointments at the University of Georgia and the University of South Carolina, where she supervised Secondary Choral Music Education. She is a Past President of Southern Region ACDA and Georgia ACDA, and she developed ChorTransform, ACDA's service-learning initiative for student chapters. Her focus on professional mentoring led Dr. Walker to found Facets,™ a leadership retreat for women conductors. In Columbia, she

conducts a chamber choir of music educators called Limited Time Only, and she maintains an active schedule as a guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator. A long-time church musician, Dr. Walker has served churches in Florida, Kentucky, Georgia, and South Carolina, and she presently conducts the Chancel Choir at Shandon Presbyterian Church. She was a committee chair for the development of Celebrating Grace, a hymnal published in 2010, and is a contributing author for Sacred Choral Music Repertoire: Insight for Conductors. Dr. Walker was guest editor of the February 2021 Choral Journal, ACDA's focus issue on pedagogy. She is the author of the "Path to the Podium" conducting curriculum; her research interests include conducting pedagogy, service-learning, and choral composers of the English Musical Renaissance. She is a Life Member of ACDA, and holds memberships in NAfME and NCCO.

The School of the Arts High School Symphony has roughly 50 string students, plus woodwinds, brass and percussion students from the band program led by Ken Turner. The SOA High School Orchestra averages six evening performances and several overnight trips each year. In 2019, the Symphony's string section performed at the Midwest International Band and Orchestra Clinic--the first South Carolina Orchestra to perform at Midwest in 36 years. The SOA orchestras have performed twice at the National Adjudicators Invitational and

Dr. Christopher Selby is the author of Habits of a Successful Orchestra Director, Music Theory for the Successful String Musician, and co-author of the Habits of a Successful String Musician series, a collection of string method books for middle and upper-level orchestras published by GIA. He is an active clinician and conductor, and has presented sessions at numerous Midwest Clinics, American String Teacher Association (ASTA) National Conferences, and state conferences across America. Dr. Selby currently directs the high school orchestras at the School of the Arts in Charleston, SC. Under his direction, the School of the Arts HS Orchestras performed at the 2019 Midwest Clinic, and they won the 2016 ASTA National Orchestra Festival's top award of Grand Champion

in the competitive public school division.

Dr. Selby earned his music education degree from the Hartt School of Music in Connecticut, and a Masters and Doctorate of Musical Arts degrees in Orchestral Conducting from the University of South Carolina. He began teaching at the Charleston School of the Arts in 2012, and before that Dr. Selby taught orchestra in traditional elementary, middle and high schools since 1992 He was the Orchestra Coordinator in Richland School District Two from 2001 to 2012, where he taught high school and supervised the district's orchestra curriculum and instruction.

Dr. Selby regularly guest conducts Regional and All-State Orchestras across the southeast. He is currently the Chair of the ASTA K-12 Committee, and also held leadership positions in the National Association for Music Education (NAfME). Dr. Selby served two separate terms as the President of the state's Orchestra Division, and he was the President of the South Carolina Music Educators Association (SCMEA) from 2011-2013. He was named the SC ASTA Orchestra Teacher of the Year in 2009. He is a contributing author for Teaching Music Through Performance in Orchestra, vol. 4 and has written articles for NAfME and in ASTA's American String Teacher.


