Dear Fellow Music Educators,

I wish to extend my thoughts regarding the power of music. I believe that music is innately multifaceted. Among others, the discipline of music may be used to teach, entertain, and connect. For instance, music educators may use specific compositions to inform students about specific events as students learn to perform those compositions. Solo artists and directors of ensembles present concerts and recitals that may be both entertaining and educational. Music educators may also connect music to principles of diversity and equity.

In performance and non-performance classes, music educators may use music from around the world to highlight diversity principles. Educators may also have students share the music of their culture and their community to highlight diversity principles. Students may demonstrate what they know because of cultural music experiences they've acquired in their communities. Peers may then be given opportunities to discuss and question each other about such practices.

Diversity and equity may also be developed by using students' cultural music practices as leverage for learning new, unfamiliar music. Music educators may find that students are more inclined to try new music when they understand practices of new music that are familiar to them. Additionally, diversity may be emphasized via students' musical creativity output. Specific criteria and guidelines could be determining factors for obtaining insights into students' creative products. Because of its multifaceted nature, teaching music not only improves music knowledge and skills, but it also presents additional learning opportunities.

As you prepare to attend the 2024 SCMEA annual conference, please join the Higher Education Division as we continue to advocate for music and music education in South Carolina.

Greetings, SC musicians! I hope this letter finds you rejuvenated from your summer endeavors and ready to infuse music into the lives of more young people entering your classrooms this fall. Upon reflection, the Piano Division has had many successes in the last three years: We have increased the number of programs participating in our events, more than tripled the number of students participating in our Fall and Spring Festivals, and the continued legacy of getting some of the best adjudicators and clinicians from around the state for our events.

Spring Master Class Clinician, Dr. Irina Pezner, did an excellent job getting some technical and musical elements out of our featured students. The Spring Honors Recital directly followed and showcased many talented students from across the state at the University of South Carolina Recital Hall on Saturday, May 20, 2023.

We are improving our Piano Festivals by streamlining registration and adding a second adjudicator at each site in the 2023-24 school year to promote impartiality and benefit students and teachers. We are joining SCMTA to host the January Piano Workshop and student master class at Fox Music House in Charleston, SC. Several sessions will be with a nationally recognized Alfred composer and a master class featuring students performing their compositions. We are continuing to host more facilitators with sessions relating to piano education from around the country at our upcoming SCMEA Conference and possibly adding an event for class piano ensembles in the near future.

This year, our Fall Piano Festival will be held on December 1st for the Lower State at Yeaman's Park Presbyterian Church in Hanahan, SC, and on November 30th for the Upper State at St. David's Lutheran Church in West Columbia, SC. Our Fall Master Class clinician is Robert Kelley, a Lander University Piano and Music Theory professor. The Fall Honors Recital will be at the 2024 SCMEA Conference.

Our mission in 2023-24 is to continue connecting with as many Piano teachers and programs across the state as possible so they have all the support they need to thrive. Just like most of our officers and participating teachers, we have noticed that most teachers in the Piano Division are in more than one division. Some are in multiple areas by choice, and others to fill out their schedule. We have found that embracing being in numerous divisions can be a good problem: More music equals more avenues to reach more students that can impact their lives! Dr. Mackie V. Spradley is the Immediate Past President of the National Association for Music Education and serves as the Director of Curriculum Programs at the Texas Education Agency in Austin, TX. She received the B.M. in Voice from UNT and M.A. in Vocal Pedagogy from Texas Woman's University, Denton. She received her Ph.D. in Curriculum and Instruction with an emphasis in Anthropology from UNT. Spradley has published in academic journals and books, such as the National Forum of Multicultural Issues Journal, Texas Music Educators Conference Connections, and a book chapter in Educational Leadership and Music. She is a national speaker on music education, culturally responsive pedagogy, and critical theory.

As a presenter, Mackie has shared her expertise throughout the United States and abroad. She has presented at various state, national and international conferences including, Texas Music Educators Association, Colorado Music Educators Association, the Society for Music Teachers Education, National Association for Music Education (formerly MENC), Texas Choral Directors Association, the National Association for Multicultural Education Texas Conference, and the Gospel Music Workshop of America, Inc.

Mackie is a published author with research interests in music teacher effectiveness, critical discourse, culturally responsive teaching, and critical theory. Mackie continues to focus her work and efforts on issues related to equity in music education.



Amalia Allan is an Assistant Professor of Music Education at Anderson University. She teaches graduate level courses on music teaching and research, guides master's students in their research projects, and teaches undergraduate music methods.

Dr. Allan is a passionate researcher whose research focuses on teaching music to people with diverse abilities, multiculturalism in music education, and music teacher preparation for inclusion.



Dr. Matthew Arau, author of Upbeat! Mindset, Mindfulness, and Leadership in Music Education and Beyond and founder of Upbeat Global, is an Associate Professor of Music and the Chair of the Music Education Department and Symphonic

Band Conductor at Lawrence University in Appleton, Wisconsin. Dr. Arau serves as Leadership Editor for GIA Publications, Board Member of SLAM, and as a Conn-Selmer Education Clinician.

Dr. Arau has guest conducted and presented clinics on leadership, mindfulness, growth mindset, rehearsal techniques, and creating positive cultures in person in 34 states and 4 continents in person. He has presented at the International Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic several times, the Western International Band Clinic, the NAfME National Conference, numerous State and Regional Music Education Association Conferences, the ACDA Next Direction Conference, and the Conn-Selmer Institute. Thousands of high school students have attended his Upbeat! Leadership Academies across the country to develop their leadership skills and reach for their fullest potential. In addition to being in demand as a keynote speaker, presenter, and professional development facilitator, Dr. Arau has conducted honor bands in Australia, Greece, Cyprus, and Malaysia, and All-State honor bands across the United States.

Dr. Arau draws on a deep reservoir of fifteen years of experience as a successful middle school and high school band director in Loveland, Colorado, where he led his bands at Walt Clark Middle School and Loveland High School to numerous honor performances and championships and pioneered the Leadership Symposium. Eric Crawford is interim chair of the music department at Claflin University in Orangeburg, South Carolina. He holds a Ph.D. in musicology from The Catholic University of America. His research focuses on the rich tradition of Gullah music, specifi-

cally the retentions and alterations that have occurred since the antebellum period. Beginning in 2007, he conducted extensive field recordings on Saint Helena Island, site of the historic Port Royal Experiment, and his transcriptions are held at the Folklife Center at the Library of Congress. An outgrowth of this work was the Saint Helena Island Gullah Spirituals Project, which brought together noted scholars and students to preserve and foster the study of the earliest recorded Negro spirituals. In 2013, the Athenaeum Press at Coastal Carolina University published his field interviews in a CD and accompanying booklet entitled Gullah: The Voice of an Island.

His work on historic Sandy Island led to the 2017 publication At Low Tide: The Voices of Sandy Island. This booklet and interactive multi-media project highlight the rich history of Sandy Island and the need to ensure this island's continued survival. As part of this effort, the National Park Service awarded Coastal Carolina University an African American Civil Rights grant to rebuild the island's historic school and create an interactive cultural center. Since 2018, Crawford has worked on the Gullah Geechee Digital Project, which digitizes more than 6,900 historic records from plantation journals, musical transcriptions, and contemporary oral histories. In 2021, he appeared in Henry Louis Gates' miniseries "The Black Church" and was music consultant for the Amazon miniseries "The Underground Railroad." His books are Gullah Spirituals: The Sound of Freedom and Protest in the South Carolina Sea Islands (University of South Carolina Press, 2021) and Gullah Culture in America (Blair Publishing, 2023).



David Cudd is retired from public education where he served as a high school band/choral director and classroom teacher for 28 years. In the fall of 2015, he was named the Music Education Coordinator at North Greenville University where

he currently serves as the Associate Dean and Department Chair. Dr. Cudd holds a Bachelor's degree in music education from Furman University, a Master's degree in music education from the University of Southern Mississippi, and has earned a Doctorate in educational leadership from Nova Southeastern University.

In addition to teaching high school band in NC, FL, and NY, Greg has consulted and arranged for competitive marching programs around the country. He traveled globally as a trumpet player, performing in Australia, France, Hong Kong, and on multiple cruise ships. In 2001 he became a cast member of the Emmy and Tony Award-winning Broadway show Blast!, in which he was a lead trumpet and soloist.

Under his leadership and recruiting, the band program nearly doubled in size, and incoming classes of music majors tripled. Yet COVID forced the university to make difficult financial choices, and rather than teach a college band with no music majors, Greg chose to pursue a new path in South Carolina.

Since Greg's arrival at Blythewood High School, the marching band has grown by nearly 65% and been a consistent SCBDA 5A State Finalist. At CPA, Blythewood's two bands have been awarded only "Superiors with Distinction", with the Wind Symphony performing in Grade VI and Grade VI Masterworks. Blythewood's participation in has All-State reached new highs; in 2023, 37 BHS musicians were seated in Region 3, and seven were seated in All-State.
